

Printing Instructions

I recommend using "Cover Stock" or lightweight cardstock paper {67 lb}, especially since this needs to be printed double-sided.

If you have a Double-Sided Printer: 1. Select: Print Range/From > pages **2** to **5** 2. Select: Layout > Two-Sided > "Short-Edge Binding" {This will ensure all the pages are right side up!} 3. Print!

Otherwise: Print pages 2 & 4, then print pages 3 & 5 on reverse side -OR- print each page one at a time (this booklet will not "make sense" unless it is printed on both sides and folded up.)





There was a famine in the land; food became scarce and many became hungry. Abram and his family decided to travel south through the desert to Egypt to find food



Why did Abram want his wife Sarai to pretend to be his sister?








MEMORY VERSE
